Our public education activities are organized around three themes:

- **Slow the Spread:** Basic prevention measures that should be taken while waiting for the vaccine
- **Building Vaccine Confidence:** Information and resources to build vaccine confidence, timed to support action when vaccines are available; AND
- **Preparing the Nation:** Fact based, scientific information about vaccine development, safety, and effectiveness

We have a **map** that shows COVID-19 vaccination hesitancy estimates by county, where darker shades indicate higher rates of vaccine hesitancy. Vaccine hesitancy rates are derived from surveys conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau

The “We Can Do This” campaign consists of educational materials and resources that our partners can use to help promote and strengthen public confidence in the COVID-19 vaccine. These materials are tailored for to reach a number of specific audiences through a variety of ways in a number of languages. Users can filter the materials by each of these groups to refine their search.

There are several types of resources for reaching your audiences.

- Social Media – Facebook and Twitter posts and images
- Informational Content – Newsletter blurbs, text messages, user guides and other information
- Posters and Flyers – that you can distribute or post in your public spaces
- Videos – that you can post on social media, have playing in lobbies and waiting rooms, and advertisements
- Toolkits offer complete resources for various audiences and include user guides, FAQs, media posts and graphics, Facebook Live events, and more
- Campaign Ads – are television advertisements; and
- Audio – A series of podcasts, on topics including: Addressing the COVID-19 Partisan Divide, Vaccinating the Hispanic Community, and Vaccine Facts vs. Fiction with Dr. Anthony Fauci
- Information on how to get your vaccine

- Tips for other preventive measures to take during the pandemic in addition to vaccines
- Talking points, FAQs, and other documents to support you in your outreach
- Factual information on vaccine safety
- Benefits of getting vaccinated
- General factual information, including videos, FAQs, informational sheets, etc.
- Information on how the vaccines were developed and ensuring that they are safe

ERC Resource Priorities

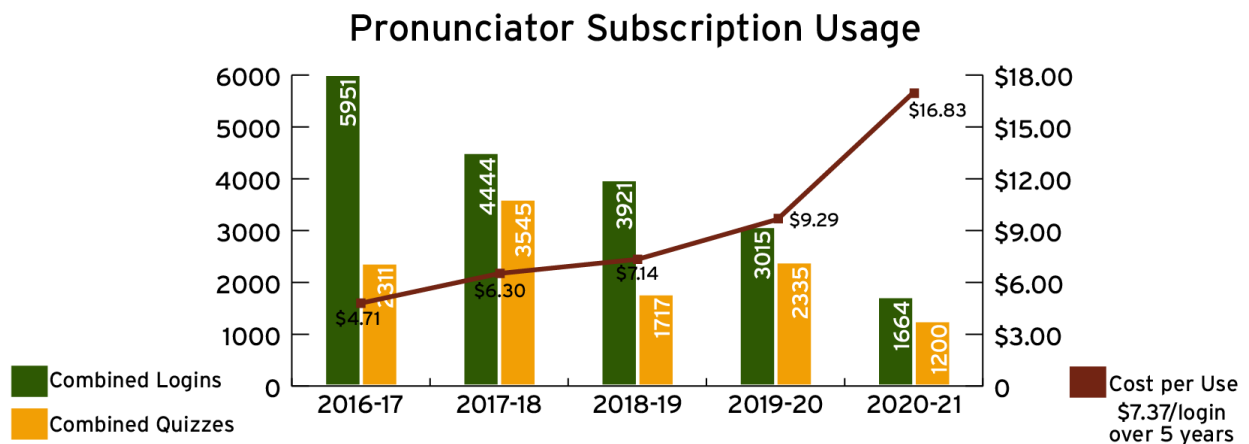
ERC Meeting Minutes of October 16, 2019

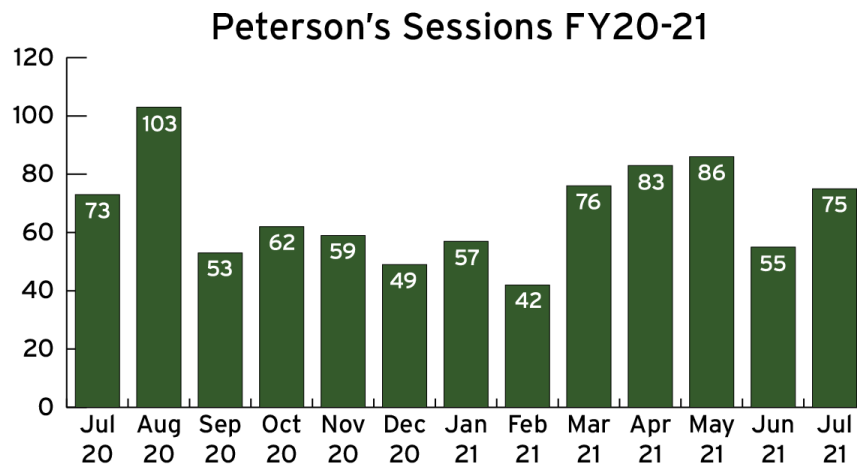
Boyer referred to resource priorities stats that he emailed to committee members after the last ERC meeting. Boyer shared Mary Ellen's suggestion that the committee use a different approach for this year's RFQ which is to create an RFQ requesting general priorities instead of a whole database package which will provide access to more vendors. Conversation was held among committee members and resource priorities were categorized as follows:
